Writing the Honours Proposal (2 hours)

 Target group: Honours students
 writing/about to write their proposal.
 Bring: draft of sections of proposal.
 Provides models and guidelines for writing a thesis proposal.

Managing the Honours Year (2 hours)

Room 331 Old Teachers' College A22 Target group: Honours students in the first semester of their honours year. Bring: time lines. Examines strategies for setting goals, prioritising tasks and constructing a flexible time plan for the honours year.
